# **School News**

We can't believe we have come to the end of yet another term and that spring has arrived - the school year is passing by so quickly.

The school has taken part in an Enrichment Week with the theme 'Victorians'. As

part of this week the whole school came dressed as Victorian school children to experience a Victorian classroom. Each class was given the opportunity to have a lesson in the same style as children in the Victorian period. The children were all expected to write with their right hands, use chalk and slate, recite times tables and the alphabet and some children had to wear the dunce hat!



Children all looked the part by dressing as Victorian school children. The whole school had a Victorian style assembly- recapping the school rules, hearing a Bible reading, singing All Things Bright and Beautiful and The National Anthem. It was very different to the friendly, child led collective worships we have today.

Whilst the school was enjoying learning about Victorians, our Year 6 children were having fun at Marrick Priory Outdoor Education and Residential Centre in Reeth, near Richmond. This year the children had the opportunity to carry out a number of



activities including archery, high and low ropes, abseiling, camp crafts and a day walk to name just a few. On their return some children told me which activities they enjoyed the most. The low ropes were enjoyed because there were no limits and the children felt free, another popular activity was the high ropes where the children had to challenge themselves, particularly if they were a little afraid of heights, as at the end they had to decide if they felt

able to do the leap of faith. Some children particularly enjoyed the night line because they were blind folded and they had to work as a group in order to complete the course. This activity was a lot of fun!

On Shrove Tuesday, FOBS (Friends of Badsworth School) arranged for the children to buy a pancake. The children enjoyed this afternoon treat and were spoilt for choice when choosing their favourite toppings from strawberries, bananas, marshmallows, cream and chocolate sauce.

This Lent our children have taken a different approach to lent. FOBS gave each child a tube of Smarties and in return children were asked to give or carry out a good deed for others for 20p. Once Lent is over the filled Smartie tubes will be returned to school in order to raise money for FOBS.

We ended our term with our annual Easter service in church. Each class played an important role in sharing the main parts of the Easter story or in celebrating this special festival by using drama, songs, poems and stories. The service was a lovely way to complete the half term.

This term we have also said goodbye to Mrs. Jones who has retired as Headteacher. Mrs. Jones has worked at the school for 20 years as a teacher, deputy headteacher and headteacher. School has celebrated her retirement in a number of ways and we know she will be missed. We know what an impact she has had on the children and staff and everyone at school wishes her a very happy retirement.

### Questionnaire


You should receive, along with this issue, a short questionnaire from the Village Plan Committee which covers two very important village issues. Firstly, we have an opportunity to put together some serious, long-term plans to create a "Village Green" on the edge of the village, using what is currently Glebe Land (i.e. owned by the Church). There is enormous potential in what is currently an eight-acre plot, but we can only progress the project if there is support from the village as a whole to take this forward. Further details are given in the questionnaire.

The second issue covered by the questionnaire is that of speed control. Again, there are things we would like to do but we can only move forward if we have support from residents.

Please look carefully at the questions and give us your feedback. Volunteers will collect the questionnaires around 26-29 April so please take a few minutes to complete them.

### Green & Pleasant Village

The group is awaiting formal feedback from the Parish Council following submission of our proposal regarding the enhancement of certain areas of public space within the village. In the short term, two members of the Village Plan Committee have agreed to do some major renovation work on the bench down Ninevah Lane and this has been approved by the Parish Council.

# Feature article

### What Badsworth means to me...

I only moved to Badsworth in 2014, so I've presently only lived here for four and a half years, it has however been part of my life since I was nine years old and I've been drawn here ever since. As a young girl I used to spend hours in Badsworth cemetery sitting with my friends, excitedly sharing ghost stories. Had my parents known I'd walked all the way from Upton, I'd have been in serious trouble, but it was well worth the risk.

I always felt there was something magical about the place and I used to tell myself as a teenager, 'One day, I'll live there.' I told all my friends and family how much I'd love to live there and as I got older and married and had a family of my own, I introduced them to the village. My son is buried in the church grounds, opposite the church entrance and my eldest two daughters went to the school here. As a family we have been a part of this village for a long time and it has been a part of us. It was inevitable that when the opportunity arose, we would live here.

It's a beautiful place and there is so much history. I love the charm that Badsworth has, from the moment you set foot here. Whether you enter from New Road or from the Beaconfield Road, as I used to all those years ago as a starry eyed nine-year-old, there is an air of beauty and mystery, like a well-hidden secret. Writer David Gerrard describes the village in 'The Hidden Places of Yorkshire' as 'a jewel. A delightful village of old houses and mature trees.' It certainly is a hidden gem.

I love being part of the community and there is so much here to see, no matter how much time I spend looking, I can always notice something I hadn't before, whether it's a tree in the field or a different part of the wall that can be seen around the village. I am lucky to have quite a large portion of that wall in my own garden. It's the boundary between us and our neighbours. It's a beautiful wall. It would be so easy to walk around the village and not notice it, but I have it on good authority that that wall is three hundred years old. Three hundred years old and still going strong. Imagine the people, the lives and the secrets that wall has witnessed over those years.

The church, the wall, the scenery and the history are all part of the charm and the beauty that is Badsworth. What's not to love!


