Keeping Badsworth Tidy

Over the past couple of months many more people have been walking around the village on a regular basis and have possibly been struck by the fact that keeping the village looking tidy is not always easy.

One area of concern has been the churchyard, although this is something which has not just become a problem since lockdown.

Reverend Charlene Smith, who is currently looking after the Church in Badsworth, is very keen to see the look and feel of areas of the churchyard enhanced and would like to request the support and assistance of volunteers from the village.

Our church can be dated back some 800 years and various graves within the churchyard are also of considerable age and historical significance. Importantly, the graveyard is in current use and areas around the more recent graves and memorial urns are looking particularly unkempt.

The Council does strim and cut the grass but this does not address some of the other issues. For this reason, we are looking to identify people from the village who would be happy to help with some clearing up – probably starting in mid-late July of this year. This way, we can do all the necessary tasks before the autumn weather takes hold.

The following are just some examples of the sort of areas we are looking to tackle:

- The old drainage gullies around the church itself need clearing and vegetation growing up the church walls needs addressing so as to minimise damp issues inside the building itself.
- Many graves are overgrown either with ivy or grass or both.
- An entire rubbish heap has accumulated in one area near the more recent graves and this needs clearing.

A specific plan and list of tasks is being drawn up and we are looking to liaise with Wakefield Council for the provision of suitable bags, equipment and collection of rubbish.

We'll put out a reminder on social media nearer the time but please do contact me if you are willing and able to help as that will give an idea of numbers. Because the work is outdoors, we believe it will be safe but we will look to organise the activity in whatever ways best suit the restrictions in place in mid-July.

Badsworth Emergency Support Team (or B.E.S.T.).

As the scale of the impending crisis became evident in mid-March, it was clear that many in the village felt a need to feel useful and to ensure that everyone in the village

was well looked after. As a result, we created the B.E.S.T "helpline". This is open to ANYONE in the village, regardless of age or circumstance, and is still operating, and we wanted to remind people that the team is still there to provide support if required. Volunteers can, if required, provide a variety of help such as collecting medication or



prescriptions, small scale shopping, providing IT support and ideas as to how to use technology to prevent isolation, as well as just providing a friendly ear for anyone who wants to have a chat. We also have a number of dog owners on the list so we can provide dog walking services if you ever need them. Contact numbers are below and also on the Website so please don't be afraid to call.

Staying Connected

We know that many people value Our Badsworth Way as a means of finding out what's happening in the village and simply feeling part of a wider community. Over the past two months it would have been nice to have been able to produce special issues of the newsletter, but practicalities around printing and distribution have made that impossible. However,



we did urge everyone to gain access to the village website if at all possible as that could be used to share the latest information.

The village website is a great showcase for the village. There are a number of people and organisations linking back to the website, local history and genealogy sites in particular. It has been updated and reorganised over the last few months to make navigation easier. Since March the website has had over 1,200 views, an increase of 67%. The website address is www.badsworthvillage.com and if there is anything you want to see on the website, please complete the contact form and let me know.

The village Facebook page was relaunched at the end of March this year. No comparable stats for the same period as the website, but over the last 4 weeks posts have been seen by over 900 people, up by 73% over the previous period. There have been almost 1,000 engagements with these posts by liking, commenting and sharing - up by 37%. This is due in no small part



to Colin Williams and his piano concert on VE Day. The video has been seen by over 600 people, thank you Colin!

News Updates

VE Day Celebrations

Despite the lockdown, people in the village managed to find innovative ways to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of VE Day. I couldn't help feeling sorry for all those people who had spent months (if not longer) planning large scale national or community level events, only to see them cancelled or having to be rethought so as to comply with restrictions. The village-wide highlight of the day seemed to be a virtuoso piano performance of



songs from the 1940s from our very own Colin Williams. Colin's 30-minute concert was streamed live via Facebook and it was great to see how many people "tuned in" and commented on what a great event it was. Our thanks go to Colin for his time, effort and performance, and also to Rowena for filming so we could all share in it!

Garden Bin Collections and Waste Disposal

Wakefield Council's Recycling Centres are now open again but with some restrictions in place, but at least it means that people can now safely dispose of any rubbish or items which have accumulated as part of the tidying and clearing out that many of us have done during lockdown.

We are also looking forward to the first **garden bin** collection since March. These collections are due to start this month and the **scheduled collection for Badsworth is Tuesday 23 June.** WMDC have written to everyone but you might want to make a note of that date! Update on School Opening and use of Public Footpath

The school is planning to begin a phased reopening from Monday 8 June. This is only for 3 classes and for key workers so by far not the whole school. As part of their risk assessment and following the Government guidance a scattered start and finish time is recommended. Along with this a one-way system for parents is also recommended for drop off and collection times.

News Updates

In Badsworth, this means parents will walk down the main school path and up Badsworth Way footpath between St Mary's Centre and the Church.

The amended start times range from 8.45am - 9.15am and the amended finishing times are from 3pm - 3.30pm.

This obviously means there will be more people on Badsworth Way at these times so the Head Teacher wanted to ensure local residents were informed. The footpath is obviously quite narrow so please be aware that the above times will be busier.

Parish Council Meetings

You may be aware that current government guidance prevents the Parish Council from meeting face to face at the moment. As soon as the guidance changes, the Parish Council will review the situation. It is unlikely that the Parish Council will be able to meet face to face until July at the earliest unless government guidance changes in the near future.

The Parish Council is continuing to operate during the lockdown even though it isn't meeting. A process has been put in place to enable the Council to make decisions and deal with issues that arise. The Parish Council can be contacted via email at badsworthparishcouncil@outlook.com.

Once Parish Council meetings resume, the Council has agreed to change the day that it meets to a Wednesday evening to accommodate other bookings at the Lawson Hut. So meetings will take place on the 3rd Wednesday every month at 7.30pm. A public forum will also be held from 7pm to 7.30pm to provide an opportunity for residents to meet councillors and talk about any issues they might have.

Parish Council Update on Hanging Baskets

We are pleased that the summer hanging baskets have now been delivered and put up round the village.

We hope this will bring some more colour to the village along with all the other flowers and shrubs that residents have planted.

Over the past few weeks, many of us have been able to spend more time in the garden, and many have become more adventurous with what we are trying to do, including growing fruit and vegetables. I, for one, have various forms of soft fruit growing in pots, and my favourite tomatoes are growing away nicely in a sunny spot at the front. Gardening can be both challenging and rewarding, but most of all it helps our mental wellbeing and can be FUN. We hope to have a regular page on gardening, thanks largely to our unnamed contributor below — "the clot with a plot".

"It seemed like a good idea at the time. We downsized our house and bought a cottage with a garden the size of a postage stamp. To be honest I can't complain, no lawn to mow, only a few weeds to pull up and beautiful views of the Village. Definitely a good trade, but nowhere to grow veg, which is of course what you do if you're after the Good Life. And to be honest, who wouldn't want to get their hands dirty next to Felicity Kendal? Lifting up some stone paving and building a raised bed has provided some light gardening duties and attracted a fair few birds and bees. Sadly, no sign of Felicity Kendal so far.

Clearly, I needed a more serious looking patch of ground to work my magic. I am new to this gardening lark. I'm good at digging holes and making wonky wooden structures, which is part of the gardener's skill set I know. It's only a small stretch to filling said holes with seeds and small plants and letting nature do the rest. Can't be that hard can it?



After several weeks of wandering around the village staring jealously at the well-tended plots, bursting with green shoots of, of... what is that? I ask my wife. Onions she says. Ah and what about those? Carrots. She turns and smiles. I can see those maternal instincts in her eyes. There there she's saying, you'll get the hang of it one day".

Gardening Delight

Wise watering

It is rather bizarre trying to come up with some tips on watering your garden or veg patch when it is absolutely tipping it down outside, but given we've had such a dry spell, and we may have a dry, hot summer, it seemed worth sharing a few thoughts – hope they are useful.

- Always try to water in the cool of the day (i.e. early morning or late evening) otherwise it simply evaporates in the heat / sun.
- It's generally the roots of the plant that need the water so don't spray the leaves. Take the "rose" off the watering can or hosepipe and direct the water at the base of the plant and ensure you give it a thorough soak. Better to do this once a week, than give them a little spray every day as you want to encourage roots to grow deep. Obviously very delicate seedlings, or newly sown seeds, benefit from the rose attachment so they don't get washed away.
- Small pots and hanging baskets need daily watering, especially in hot, dry weather. Remember, terracotta pots are
 - porous so they tend to lose moisture quicker than plastic ones.
- If you have tried growing vegetables for the first time this year then remember they can be very thirsty and will need regular watering, especially once they start to flower or fruit.
- If you are using containers then try to use large ones as they won't dry out so fast. If you have lots of small ones try grouping them together to make watering easier and quicker.
- Anything with flowers or fruits will benefit from being fed. The best way to do
 this is to get some liquid tomato feed and mix that in the watering can as per the
 instructions on the container. It's not just for tomatoes, and has the right
 formulation to encourage fruits and flowers rather than just leafy growth.


